Rosehill Intermediate School Enrolment Process

The Rosehill Intermediate School Board of Trustees invites applications from parents who wish to enrol their child/ren at Rosehill Intermediate School for 2024. Rosehill Intermediate School is using online enrolments this year to enrol prospective students for

2024. Please go to our website <u>www.rosehillintermediate.school.nz</u> after Friday 8th September 2023. There are limited hard packs available from the school office for those who can not enrol online after Friday 8th September 2023..

Parents of students who live within the home zone should apply as soon as possible to assist the school to plan appropriately for next year.

Enrolment at the school is governed by an enrolment scheme, details of which are available from the school office and online from our website www.rosehillintermediate.school.nz.

The deadline for receipt of applications for out-of-zone places is 13th October 2023

The Board has determined that 50 places for Year 7 and Year 8 students are likely to be available for out-of zone students next year. The exact number of places will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the school's home zone.

If the number of out-of-zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be selected by ballot. If a ballot is required it will be held on **27th October 2023**.

Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held.



RIS Orchestral Opportunity!!

Aotea Youth Orchestra Trip- Thursday 31 August - Waiau Pa School

The sun was shining through the glass windows as we eagerly waited for the orchestra to begin. We were given the opportunity to sit both front and centre of the stage. This then gave us a grand view of the variety of instruments in the orchestra; these would then be used to create an array of both classical and modern pieces of music. A speaker then introduced the orchestra 'Aotea Youth Orchestra' and the conductor. The first piece played was an 'overture' which is commonly played at the beginning of orchestras and operas. Through the breaks between each piece, the conductor introduced us to both the instruments and families of instruments that were in the orchestra. This helped us get a better understanding of each instrument and their own individual sounds. One of the most recognized pieces played was 'the pirates of the caribbean', this piece both entertained and lively but also reminded us that orchestras too can play modern and engaging pieces rather than solemn classical pieces. Soon the music had to come to an end. We all left with a new found love for orchestral music and a passion to pick up new instruments we saw in the orchestral. This was a once in a life-time experience that left me both moved and hopefull to one day play in an orchestra too.

The youth symphony orchestra was an exceedingly beautiful and memorable experience, something that I'd been looking forward to all week. One of the most entertaining and informative parts of the show was the conductor himself. Who didn't just conduct the musicians but introduced each song along with its origins and also showcased each individual instrument, demonstrating how each instrument sounded on their own. The violin mostly carried the entire performance, producing the most sound. However the two instruments that captured most of my attention were the cello and the flute. The flute soloist truly impressed me as well as all of the other talented flute players and the excellent group of cellists, who also put on a spectacular show.

The orchestra played us 6 different songs having a range of calm and soft melodies to more fast and intense ones. Personally, I enjoyed the more fast paced pieces but the soft ones were truly heartfelt and in a way made me reflect a bit. The moment they began their first performance I felt my heart sink and I instantly fell in love with their playing. My overall favourite performance was the tune that originated from Ireland. I really enjoyed the melody and positive energy it brought into the room.

As the final notes were played I left the hall with a big interest in orchestra performances and a stronger passion for music. Attending the youth symphony orchestra was a delightful experience and my very first orchestra show, which of course has encouraged me to attend more beautiful shows in the future.
